

Year 5/6—Our class has been making books for the Kindy/Pre Primary with a values theme.


In Maths we have been working on Paths, Maps and Angles.

He only had stingers but that just made animals scared of him. His only friend was Koala, although Koala was asleep most of the time.


So Platypus didn't have any company most of the time, so he decided to steal some of the other animal's features. He decided to steal duck's bill and beaver's tail.
