Dear Parents/Caregivers,

And it's Term 4 already. I've already spoken to some parents at the gate and the common line of thought is......"where has this year gone?"

As you can see on the left-hand column, although not as many whole school activities, it is still a very busy term-culminating in our end-of-year Concert and Awards Presentation Night. I hope you have marked this night on your calendar The Year 6 students are also getting very excited (and with some apprehension) with this being their last term at Primary School. They all attended Belmont City College today to see what it will be like at High School, so it will be interesting to get their thoughts and reflections when they return on Monday.

COVID—As you would be aware, National Cabinet agreed on 30 September 2022 to implement a nationally consistent approach to easing Australia's COVID-19 response measures.

From today (14 October 2022) the COVID Transition (Testing and Isolation) Directions are revoked. This removes mandatory requirements for isolation and testing for cases and close contacts.

We know that COVID-19 remains a risk to our health and wellbeing, particularly those vulnerable to respiratory illness, so it is very important for all of us to take personal responsibility to keep ourselves, our families and our colleagues safe. We ask that you continue to keep your child home if he/she is sick, and notify the school, but you do not have to report any RAT results to us. I have attached a letter from the Education Department at the end of this newsletter.

As from next week, I will open the meeting room at 2:45pm if parents would like to sit in there to wait and chat and get to know each other. On the 11th November. following Room 3's assembly, we will open classes again for parents to visit for 15 minutes to look at the work on display and have a chat with your child about the work they have done this year.

Congratulations-As most parents are aware, Miss Lally left just before the end of 3rd term to await the arrival of her baby. I'm happy to announce that she had a beautiful little girl, arriving on the 9th October. Congratulations to Miss Lally and her family.

Welcome-Miss O'Neill has taken over Miss Lally's role in Room 3 and we welcome her to Belmont Primary School. I know that Miss O'Neill will have a great time here and that you will all make her feel really welcomed.

School Council Meeting-this will be held on the 3rd November for Council members, but if you have anything you would like discussed at this meeting, can you please forward it to me next week. Thanks.

#### **Dear Parents and Carers**


From Friday 14 October, COVID-19 mandatory isolation requirements will be removed. This change was agreed to at National Cabinet and further information will be provided later this week.

I was asked why I include attendance records each newsletter. One area of data the Education Department looks at is our Attendance Percentage, and how it compares to other schools and the whole of WA attendance data. They also look at individual student attendance rates and classify attendance as Regular (+90%) Indicated (80-<90%) Moderate (60-<80%) and Severe (<60%)

We submit attendance data twice a year to the Department, and are required to validate absences with notifications from parents for any absences—and especially for students who are indicated as "at risk". This is also why we ask for information regarding your child's absence as soon as they return to school—or preferably, that you notify the school as soon as they are sick / medical appointments / or family reasons so it can be recorded as "reasonable" and not "unexplained".

Our attendance % for 2021 was 90.7%; like schools 91.6% and WA Public Schools 91.0%. Our current attendance rate for 3 terms of 2022 is 83.7% - Regular (53%); Indicated (21)%); Moderate (17%) and Severe (9%).

We have 48% Authorised Absences (notes/explanations received) and 52% Unauthorised (no information from parents/caregivers) I do not advocate that you send your child to school if they are unwell, but a simple phone call or email to the teacher or school means that we can record the absence at Authorised. Thank for your understanding.

Max - Kambarang because there is nature growing.


Sienna - Bunuru because it is hot, my favourite day.

In HASS, for our first week exploring life and culture in Western Australia, we first looked at our own lives and how we live in Western Australia. Next week we will look at the perspective of our First Nation's people and explore what places are significant to them, the Dreaming stories that explain the creation and significance of these places, what cultural foods do they eat, and some of the language they use.
